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GIVEN NKOSI



In 2001 and 2002, he was chosen as the Tirisano School Choral Eisteddfod national champion and, in 2003 and 2004, was national champion of the Post Office Eisteddfod. Nkosi has appeared in numerous opera productions and concert performances, among others as soloist with the Cape Philharmonic Orchestra. In 2005, he won first prize in the Schock competition at the University of Cape Town. He is currently studying towards a performer's diploma at the university under the direction of Professor Angelo Gobbato and Professor Brad Liebl. Last year, he made his mark at the Miagi festival of classical music, devoted to the life and works of Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart, and performed with the Tirisano National Youth Choir at the Choir Olympics in Bremen. anney Tsimong, a gay filmmaker, has brought to life issues confronting youngsters in the townships. His eight-minute film Mountain Shade sensitively traces the journey of an urban youth — who goes to a rural area to be circumcised — as he tries to make sense of the values of his family. Tsimong began working as a dancer at the age of 15 and later acted as choreographer and event manager for the late pop star Brenda Fassie. He received the 2003 Vuka award for raw talent and studied at Afda, the film and drama academy. He conceived and directed the talkshow series Intimate Connectionz for SABC1 in 2005, hosted by celebrity Somizi Mhlongo. Mountain Shade was screened at the Out in Africa Gay and Lesbian Film festival in 2006. In the same year, Tsimong joined supergroup Malaika as choreographer and stylist, and contributed his creative talents to the television miniseries After 9. This year, he served at the Berlinale Film festival as a jury member.

GABEBA BADEROON

orn in Port Elizabeth, Gabeba Baderoon grew up in Cape Town. She uses her poetry to comment on the life journeys of women in South Africa and received the prestigious DaimlerChrysler award for poetry in 2005. Her latest volume, A Hundred Silences, explores love and loss; her previous collection, The Dream in the Next Body, traces her five-year odyssey from Cape Town to Sheffield in the United Kingdom — where she studied — to Pennsylvania in the United States. Her work appeared in the UK anthology Worldscapes in 2005 and translations of some works have been published in Sweden, Spain and Germany. Baderoon has delivered readings of her poetry at festivals in Bremen, Berlin, Stockholm and Durban and, last year, she appeared in Rotterdam, Bristol and London. She is also a literature and media scholar and holds a PhD in English from the University of Cape Town.

ape Town's radical rockers Fokofpolisiekar came together in 2003, resolving to produce new music "their own way". Francois van Coke, Hunter Kennedy, Johnny de Ridder, Wynand Myburgh and Jaco Venter, as Fokofpolisiekar, are a household name — not only because of the outrageous name of their act, but also because their songs speak to the feelings of post-apartheid Afrikaans youth. The band has played at just about every major music festival in the country, as well as the Pukkelpop festival in Belgium in 2004. To date, Fokofpolisiekar has released five albums, won numerous awards, including Blunt magazine's rock act of the year in 2004 and best album in 2006. They have appeared in a number of music magazines, including the alternative British publication Dazed and Confused.

JEREMY ARRIES

eremy grew up on Kanonkop Wine Estate and always wanted to become a winemaker. In 1998, with assistance from Kanonkop, he became the first African to matriculate from the acclaimed Boland Agricultural High School near Paarl. Soon afterwards he joined Kanonkop and, in 2003, won the Patrick Grubb Bursary, which gives people from previously disadvantaged communities a chance to gain international experience in some of the finest wineries in the world. For nearly six months he visited Quinta Nova de Nossa Senhora do Carmo in the Douro valley of Portugal, where port wines under the renowned Burmester label are made. Arries has since finished three diploma courses in senior cellar management and various courses in viticulture. He is currently taking maths classes to enable him to enrol at the University of Stellenbosch for a BSc degree in viniculture and viticulture. Arries is the assistant winemaker at Kanonkop, but hopes one day to produce wine himself that can hold its own against the big five of France.

LEBOGANG MASHILE

ebo Mashile is poetry's hottest property. This spoken-word artist and television presenter, in her late twenties, was born and raised in Providence, Rhode Island, in the United States, where her parents were in exile at the time. Since the family's return to South Africa, Mashile has established the Feela Sistah Spoken Word Collective, acted in the international feature Hotel Rwanda, published the book In a Ribbon of Rhythm and launched a CD of live poetry mixed with beats called Lebo Mashile Live. She is also the executive producer and host of SABC1's travel series L'atitude. In 2004, Mashile was nominated for the prestigious DaimlerChrysler award for poetry. She holds a degree in law and international relations from the University of the Witwatersrand. Her first collection of poetry, In a Ribbon of Rhythm, won her the 2006 Noma award for publishing in Africa. Her CD was released on her independent label, Mashile Productions.



PATRICK NGAMANE

atrick Ngamane was born in the Transkei in 1972. In 1980, his family moved to the Western Cape where his father worked at Backsberg Wines. He attended classes at the farm's primary school and later at the secondary school, Bernadino Heights, in Scottsdene. After matriculating in 1994, Ngamane worked for several years at an advertising agency, but then received a scholarship from Backsberg Wines to study agriculture at Elsenburg Agricultural College Stellenbosch, He graduated in 2000 and worked at Backsberg for two years, after which he went to Thelema Mountain Vineyards. He joined Hartenberg Wine Estate in 2002, where he is currently an assistant winemaker. Ngamane clocked up valuable experience in Bordeaux, France, when he had a stint at Chateau d'Angludet in the Margaux appellation in 2003. He is a steering committee member of the Cape Winemakers Guild's protégé selection programme, which recruits young, innovative, previously disadvantaged students for the wine industry.

REUBEN RIFFEL

espite a lack of formal training, Reuben Riffel has matured into one of South Africa's premier chefs. His restaurant, Reuben's, scooped top honours at the 2004 Eat Out Johnnie Walker restaurant awards, winning both chef of the year and restaurant of the year. His first opportunity to run his own kitchen came when he was in his early twenties. He helped to establish the Monneaux restaurant as one of the top 10 restaurants in South Africa. After three years at Monneaux he moved to Cambridge, England, to run another award-winning restaurant before returning to South Africa to start his own restaurant with partners. Riffel's cuisine is eclectic, with a focus on the best local and seasonal produce available. His philosophy is simple: create extraordinary food with familiar ingredients that people know and love.











SANDILE SANZA TSHABALALA-FAKUDZE

anza "da fanatik" Tshabalala (31) is a Johannesburg street poet, a Soweto-born son, a Yeoville denizen, a Rosebank worker bee and an activist who is also a vegetarian chef with roots in Swaziland. He has recently been promoted to co-host of Yfm's flagship breakfast show, *Kamakazi*, with Rudeboy Paul. Tshabalala is an inspiration to Gauteng's young listeners with his sport, arts, culture and politics features on the radio. He is also a self-taught cook — as celebrity chef-caterer at the Spaza Art Gallery in Troyeville — who specialises in vegetarian dishes and desserts. The Spaza Art Collective, together with Tshabalala, has just launched an *Underground Jozi* map of Soweto and the inner city, which will be sold at leading bookshops, boutiques, arts institutions and cultural gatherings. Refusing to be categorised as a "celebrity", Tshabalala travels on public transport or on a scooter. He is working on a cookbook/novella, *The Pan-African Male Vegetarian*, about South African township cuisine, in which poetry and short stories will be included. Tshabalala is in the process of finalising a deal for a BBC Food pilot called *Sanzalicious*.

JUSTIN NURSE

ustin Nurse (29) was born in Cape Town and studied journalism and politics at Rhodes University. While still a student, Nurse began producing satirical T-shirts that spoofed famous brands, an enterprise that soon resulted in the formation of Laugh It Off. The company hit national headlines in 2001 when SABMiller brought a lawsuit against it, claiming that Laugh It Off's parody of its Black Label beer brand constituted an infringement of its trademark. Nurse has forged a career as an independent publisher, with Laugh It Off having thus far published a collection of poetry by Kgafela oa Magogodi, various zines as well as the popular Laugh It Off Annuals. Laugh It Off has recently started a "religion" called Humourology — with laughter as its god — and the recently published third annual features the basic religious text alongside 100 creative contributions from around the world. Nurse runs Laugh It Off from a place called The Snakehouse on a game reserve somewhere near the tip of the Cape Peninsula. Here he tries to stay out of trouble and in touch with global youth culture while busying himself with publishing projects, freelance writing and brand consultancy.

THORISO MAGONGWA

horiso Magongwa is South Africa's fastest-rising ballet star. The boyish principal dancer of Ballet Theatre Afrikan has been praised by critics for his "bravura and lightness of movement". Indeed, Magongwa can fly like a butterfly, which experts attribute to the combination of a classical training with township roots. He reached the semifinals of the Prix de Lausanne in 2000, was nominated for an FNB Dance Umbrella award for most outstanding male dancer in 2003, and reached the finals of the Helsinki International Ballet Competition in 2005. The young Sowetan has been dancing since the age of 13. Today he is principal dancer and choreographer-in-residence of the professional repertory company Ballet Theatre Afrikan.

opano Matlwa is a winner of the European Union Literary award for her first novel, Coconut (Jacana Media, 2007). Matlwa describes herself as "a restless soul". She was head girl of St Peter's College in Johannesburg, where she matriculated in 2003 with distinctions in all subjects. In 2005, she was honoured for academic excellence and leadership potential as one of eight South African Goldman Sachs Global Leaders. As a result, she represented South Africa at the 2005 Goldman Sachs Global Leadership Institute in New York City. She is a founding member and chairperson of the non-profit health promotion organisation, Waiting Room Education by Medical Students, and co-owner of Forest Hill Residence Tuckshop, a growing business that employs a staff of 10 UCT students.

MUSTAFA MALUKA

ustafa Maluka studied graphic design at the Peninsula Technikon. He has held eight solo exhibitions, the first at the young age of 19, and was included in numerous group shows in the late 1990s in Cape Town. He moved to Amsterdam towards the end of 1998 and completed a residency at the Thami Mnyele Foundation. Maluka later studied at De Ateliers and enrolled as a PhD candidate at the Amsterdam school for cultural analysis, which falls under the faculty of humanities at the University of Amsterdam. He returned to South Africa in mid-2004 and, in the same year, won the Tollman Award for the Visual Arts. In July 2005, he attended a residency programme at Art Omi in New York and in May 2007 at Glenfiddich in Scotland. Group exhibitions last year included *Nie Meer* at De Warande in Turnhout, Belgium, and *New Painting*, which showed at the KwaZulu-Natal Society of Arts gallery, the Unisa Art Gallery and the Johannesburg Art Gallery. Maluka is the founder and editor of Africanhiphop.com and Africanhiphopradio.com. Since his return from Amsterdam, he has been responsible for an upsurge in releases by numerous Cape Town-based rappers through his non-profit Aevenger Camp label. Artists released through the label include Driemanskap, Terror MC, Ill-Literate-Skill, Ben Sharpa and Archetypes.

Ithough he has no formal photographic training, Pieter Hugo has proven his talent by producing visual essays for print publications such as Adbusters, Colors, Dazed & Confused, The New Yorker and the Sunday Times in London. His images document the many and varied global social issues that plague African and developing nations. He was awarded the 2007 Standard Bank Young Artist award in the visual art category and describes his work as documentary photography. "My reasons for working in this medium are personal, not political photography enables me to engage with things that interest me and provides me with a means to explore it. I am concerned with the peripheral in society, particularly in Africa, and I negotiate contexts where the cultural nuances of our time are amplified." Hugo has received many accolades, including first prize in the portraits section of the 2006 World Press Photo competition. His next task will be to create an exhibition for the 2007 National Arts Festival. "It will be a body of work and a book about a small town in South Africa," he says.

NAPO MASHEANE

laywright, performer and social activist Napo Masheane was born in Soweto but grew up in the Free State. She is a well-trained stage practitioner, having obtained a speech and drama diploma from the Fuba School of Dramatic Arts and paying her dues as a stage manager and lighting technician at Johannesburg's premiere Market Theatre. She has benefitted from cultural exchange programmes that have taken her to Sweden, the United States, Germany, the United Kingdom and the Netherlands. But it is for her recent play, My Bum is Genetic, Deal With It, that she won widespread acclaim. The work, directed by Mail & Guardian columnist John Matshikiza, was an appeal for tolerance of cultural diversity. Masheane was a finalist in the DaimlerChrysler award for poetry in 2005. Her spoken-word adventures have taken her to venues abroad and in Southern Africa

The company creates documentaries and produces content for television and has a record label, Outrageous Records, which is home to musicians H20, Zubz, Pebbles, Proverb and Optical Illusion.

graduate of the University of Natal, Nashen Moodley won the Mail & Guardian/SL Student Journalist of the Year award in 1998. Since then, he has written on film and culture for the M&G, The Sunday Independent, GQ, Independent on Saturday, and Cape Argus. He is the film critic for Sunday Tribune and contributes to several other newspapers and magazines. Moodley is currently the manager and head programmer of the Durban International Film Festival, South Africa's longest-running film festival and, since 2005, he has been a programming consultant for the Dubai International Film Festival. He is also an international advisor to Cinema Festa Internazionale di Roma, and in December 2006 he programmed the first South African Film Festival in Tehran.

KHALO MATABANE

Fiercely independent filmmaker Khalo Matabane blends documentary and drama in his personal vision of post-apartheid South African life. In the first decade of his career, Matabane directed a series of documentaries, including Poetic Conversations, a profile of Black Consciousness poet Ingoaplee Mandingoane (1996); Two Decades Still (1996), a look at the country 20 years after the 1976 Soweto uprisings; Young Lions (1999), a about former youth freedom fighters; Love in a of Sickness (2001), a personal Aids awareness documentary; and Conversations on a Sunday Afternoon (2005), which explores the lives of immigrant communities in Johannesburg. Matabane's work has been screened at the Toronto and Berlin international film festivals.

GERHARD MARX

erhard Marx is an artist, theatre practitioner and

filmmaker. He received his MA (FA) from Wits University's School of Arts in 2004. His theatre collaborations have included works with the internationally recognised Handspring Puppet Company and premier director Lara Foot-Newton. Together they created the internationally acclaimed play Tshepang, an exploration of child rape that was seen at major venues worldwide. Marx has received Naledi awards for best set design for two consecutive years. In 2004, he was awarded the Ampersand Fellowship, a two-month-long artist's residency in the Ampersand apartment, New York. He is the creator, with Foot-Newton, of the animated short film And There in the Dust. The work enjoyed numerous screenings at film festivals across the globe and won numerous awards, including best animated film and best international short film at the Bird's Eye Festival (London, 2007), best short film at the Latin, African and Asian Film Festival (Milan, 2006) and three awards at the South African Film Awards (2006). In 2007, the collaborators received a Sundance Fellowship to participate in

the Sundance Film Festival's screenwriter's laboratory. Marx has also

kin Omotoso, the Nigerian-born actor, director and producer, is the winner of the 2007 Standard Bank Young Artist award for film. His family moved to South Africa in 1992 and shortly after Omotoso enrolled for a performers' diploma in speech and drama, the only course at UCT that did not require a matric exemption. In 1995, Omotoso won the Fleur du Cap award for most promising student for his role in Sunjata, a play directed by Mark Fleishman. Using the money he made from acting to subsidise his directorial dreams, he completed three short films. In 1999, he wrote his first feature, God is African, and soon after started a production company called T.O.M Pictures with two other partners. Their first project was producing Craig Freimond's Gums and Noses, which won Best South African Film at the New York Independent Film Festival in 2004. He has since directed a short film called Rifle Road, which was screened at the Cannes Film Festival in 2005, and his documentary in tribute to his mother, Gathering the Scattered Cousins, was selected for screening at the prestigious Toronto Film Festival in 2006. Locally, Omotoso has starred in Isidingo, Generations and Big Okes. He also played opposite Nicolas Cage in Lord of War and will soon appear in the role of Paul Kagame in Shake Hands with the Devil.

In 2000, she relocated to Johannesburg and was awarded the prestigious Duku Duku award for best female presenter in local broadcasting. Engelbrecht then decided to venture into the world of acting, joining the cast of Isidingo, where she moulded the character of Lolly. In 2007, she played the lead in the cult drama Popcorn at the Civic Theatre in Johannesburg. Engelbrecht is a multitalented ball of enthusiasm, who loves exploring her God-given talents.

These struggles evolved organically with the formation of the Mbokota Youth Congress in 1989. Since then, he has played a major role in re-establishing the ANC Youth League in villages in his area. He joined the SACP in 1993 and is currently the national chairperson of the Young Communist League. During his studies at Giyane College of Education, Masondo led the South African Student Congress and was also elected as president of the student repr council (SRC) at the college. In 1996, he was elected as Northern Transvaal provincial chairperson of the South African Student Congress, and a year later he became its national deputy president. In 1998, he was elected as SRC president at the University of the Witwatersrand and, in 1999, he was appointed the national youth commissioner. When his term expired, he was appointed as SACP national political education coordinator and youth desk coordinato. He served as the chairperson of the ANC Youth League in Limpopo province between 2003 and 2005 and is currently a political studies lecturer at Wits, where he is also studying to obtain his PhD. Masondo has published and presented a number of academic and SACP papers.

THULASIZWE BUTHELEZI

hough he is not related to Inkatha Freedom Party leader Mangosuthu Buthelezi, Thulasizwe Buthelezi is a mover and shaker in the party. At 26, it is clear that he is among the successor candidates to the octogenarian who has always led the IFP. The younger Buthelezi styles himself ser. His CV lists as a high point the hosting of the Inkatha Youth Brigade conference in Durban and not its Ulundi stronghold in December last year. He is the brigade's national chairperson and the founder of the IFP Youth Desk at the University of Cape Town. Since 2006, he has served as a member of the KwaZulu-Natal provincial legislature. "I am an outspoken proponent of getting rid of the ageing deadwood and infusing new blood into IFP structures in Parliament and at all levels," says Buthelezi. Though he is bent on yanking the IFP from Ulundi into the mainstream, he is a director of Malizwe Trading, a company building a R50-million property trading in Ulundi.

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



He is currently the attorney for the Centre for Child Law, an NGO housed at the University of Pretoria. Mungar is dedicated to promoting the rights and interests of South African children.

t 29, Natalie Simons is the youngest female priest in the Church of the Province of Southern Africa, which spreads over six Southern African countries. She serves in the St Andrew's Anglican church in Newlands, Cape Town. Simons has a master's degree in theology from Stellenbosch, where she specialised in pastoral care and counselling. Her particular passion is for interfaith dialogue and she participates in an interfaith group with Jews and Muslims. Simons is the coordinator of a programme responsible for sending 12 young South Africans to a two-week interfaith camp in New York once a year. In Cape Town, she helps to run meetings of up to 50 senior schoolchildren at a time, the purpose of which is to help them "learn to live together with difference". She also helps to run Hope Africa, the developmental arm of the Cape Town diocese that exists to alleviate poverty, educate and train, and help create self-sustaining communities.














PIETIE COETZEE

ietie Coetzee became the youngest player to be selected for the South African women's hockey team at the age of 16 and has established herself as one of the best strikers in world hockey. Born in Bloemfontein in 1978, she attended Oranje Meisieskool and later completed a degree in psychology at the University of Johannesburg. Fast approaching the 200-cap mark, Coetzee has represented South Africa at two Olympic Games (2000 and 2004), two World Cups (1998 and 2002), two Commonwealth Games (1998 and 2002) and three All Africa Games (1995, 1999 and 2003). Renowned for her lethal drag flick, she has scored an impressive 193 goals in her 194 games for the national side. Coetzee missed the Commonwealth Games in March because of a knee injury, but she is sure to add many more goals to her total at this year's World Cup in Spain at the end of September. Among her accomplishments is twice finishing as top goal scorer in the Dutch Hockey League, where she played for three seasons. Coetzee currently works as head hockey coach at the University of Johannesburg.



MAKHAYA NTINI

akhaya Ntini may have had a disappointing ICC World Cup in the West Indies, but he remains one of South Africa's best-loved sportsmen. His emergence as the first black player to represent South Africa at international level has seen the profile of cricket being raised immeasurably in what is chiefly a soccer-mad country. Hailing from the Eastern Cape village of Mdingi, Ntini developed his cricket talent while on a scholarship at Dale College in King William's Town. He was selected for the national squad to tour Australia in 1997 and made his international debut early in 1998, also making his Test debut later that same year. In 2003, images of Ntini kissing the pitch were beamed around the world after he became the first South African to take 10 wickets in a Test at Lord's, a feat achieved by just nine other bowlers in cricket history. He topped that with 13 wickets for 132 runs against the West Indies in Trinidad in 2005, the best figures to date by a South African bowler in a Test match. Since then, the 29-year-old has passed many other milestones, one of which was becoming only the third South African to take 300 Test wickets, when he dismissed Pakistan's Mohammed Sami earlier this year.


ROLAND SCHOEMAN

After a somewhat disappointing performance at the World Championships in Melbourne earlier this year (one gold in the 50m butterfly as opposed to two golds, a silver and two world records at the last World Championships in 2005), he is eager to get back on to the top of the podium in Beijing next year.

CHARL SCHWARTZEL



JOHN SMIT

n 2004, John Smit became the 51st man to captain the Springboks, having made his debut in the side two years earlier. Born in Polokwane in 1978, he attended Pretoria Boys High, where he was head boy and achieved rugby success from a young age. Smit rose steadily through the ranks, representing Northern Transvaal at Craven Week in 1995/96, South African schools in 1996, South Africa under-21s from 1997 to 1999 and then, eventually, the national team. Since then he has emerged as one of the more successful Springbok captains, managing to win 22 of the 35 games he has played as captain. In 2004, Smit led the side to their first Tri-Nations victory since 1998 and has also enjoyed success captaining the Sharks side. The Durban-based hooker is married with two children and is known for superstitiously wearing only black underwear during matches. Smit has signed with French club Clarmont, a position he will take up after the 2007 World Cup.



LOOTS BOSMAN

robably best known for his exploits in Twenty20 cricket, Loots Bosman could be the man to watch when the inaugural World Championship in the shorter form of the game takes place on home soil later this year. Born in Kimberley, Bosman is renowned for his flamboyant batting style, which is ideal for packing on the runs early in a game. He has had a few chances in one-day internationals (having been included in the South African squad for the Champions Trophy and the World Cup, but not being used in the team on a regular basis), but it is as an opener for his franchise side in Twenty20 games that he has really shone. Bosman made his debut for Griqualand West in 1997 and later moved to the Free State Fagles, It was for the Fagles that he scored the fastest 50 (off 22 balls) in the Standard Bank Pro20 series against the Highveld Lions last year. He was named player of the series that same year after also becoming the first batsman to score a century in the series, off just 43 balls.

LIEZEL HUBER


n a sport that has produced many a champion for South Africa in the past but has gone quiet of late, Liezel Huber remains one of the few to fly the South African flag at the top of the world's tennis rankings. Born is Durban in 1976, Huber is based in the United States, where she lives with her husband and coach, Tony. She started playing tennis at the age of five and enjoyed much success at a local and national level. She has since excelled in the professional doubles circuit, teaming up with Zimbabwe's Cara Black to win the women's doubles title at Wimbledon in 2005. Later that year, she was named as the South African Sportswoman of the Year. A career-threatening knee injury picked up just five days after her Wimbledon victory ruled her out of competitive tennis for several months, but a remarkable recovery saw her once again joining Black on the court to take the Australian Open doubles title earlier this year - the pair's 19th major victory to date. Huber represented South Africa in the Federation Cup in 2003 and at the Olympic Games in 2000. In 2005, she set up a foundation called Liezel's Cause to raise funds for the victims of hurricane Katrina

GRAEME SMITH

t has been an up-and-down few years for Graeme Smith and, following a rather shaky World Cup campaign and that embarrassing semifinal disintegration, there have been calls for his resignation. But that should not detract from the Johannesburg-born left-hander's exploits with the bat since his Test debut back in 2002. Having had the captaincy of the team thrust upon him in 2003 at the age of 22, Smith took the massive responsibility in his stride, scoring double centuries in consecutive Tests during South Africa's tour to England, In 2004, he was named Wisden Crid the Year. But perhaps the innings for which he is best remembered is his 90 off 55 balls (in a partnership of 187 with Herschelle Gibbs), which set the platform for South Africa's memorable 438-run chase to defeat Australia 3-2 in a one-day international series in March last year. Smith is known for his frosty relationships and verbal exchanges with several international players, but many put this down to his passionate determination to succeed. Despite his team's pitiful exit from the recent ICC World Cup semifinal, Smith would not be too disappointed with his performance at the tournament, having scored four consecutive halfcenturies at the start of the competition.

GERHARD ZANDBERG

t was as a plucky 20-year-old that Gerhard Zandberg first made headlines as the only South African to bring home a medal from the 2003 World Swimming Championships in Barcelona - he took the bronze in the 50m backstroke. Since then he has had to stand back to the likes of bigger stars such as Roland Schoeman and Ryk Neethling. But in April this year he was back on the podium and this time he was on top, claiming the 50m backstroke gold at the World Championships in Melbourne. Melbourne's pools have been a happy hunting ground for the Pretoria resident who, just a year ago, joined Schoeman, Neethling and Lyndon Ferns to win gold for South Africa in the 4 x 100m freestyle relay at the Commonwealth Games. He also claimed a bronze medal in the individual 50m backstroke in the same competition and holds the South African and African records in the 50m and 100m backstroke events. Zandberg trains under national coach Dirk Lange at the High Performance Centre in Pretoria and acts as coach and mentor to several younger swimmers. Only 24 years old, it seems there is plenty still to come from the national, continental and now world champion.

SUZAAN VAN BILJON

fter women's swimming in South Africa experienced a bit of a dry spell since the glory days of Penny Heyns, it came as a pleasant surprise to see another promising breaststroker on the horizon. Suzaan van Biljon generally does not like to be compared to the double Olympic gold medalist but, considering that she swims the same events, the comparisons are inevitable. At the age of 19, Van Biljon has yet to compete at the Olympic Games, but she earned her place in Swimming South Africa's elite squad by reaching the finals of the 100m and 200m breaststroke at the 2005 World Championships. Two years later, at the World Championships in Melbourne, she reached the final of the 200m breaststroke once again and just missed out on a medal, finishing in fourth place. Medal rostrums are not unfamiliar to the Pretoria teenager, however, having picked up three medals at the Commonwealth Youth Games in 2004, a bronze medal at the Commonwealth Games last year and a gold at the Pan-Pacific Championships later that same year.

NATALIE DU TOIT

atalie du Toit needs little introduction. The number of accolades she has accumulated continues to mount and yet she is still tirelessly in pursuit of the one that has thus far eluded her: representing South Africa against able-bodied swimmers at the Olympic Games. After representing the country at the Commonwealth Games in Kuala Lumpur at the age of 14, Du Toit lost her leg after a motorbike accident on her way back from training in 2001. Determined not to let anything get in her way, the Capetonian was back in the water competing just 124 days later. The following year, she was back in South African colours, winning two golds in disabled events and reaching the able-bodied final of the 800m freestyle at the Commonwealth Games in Manchester. Since then she has collected five Paralympic golds and a silver medal and has racked up so many world records she must have lost count by now. Du Toit spends her spare time travelling the country as a motivational speaker and recently published her autobiography, Tumble Turn. She received the first-ever David Dixon Award in 2002 — presented to the most outstanding athlete at the Commonwealth Games — and has been nominated for the Laureas World Sportsperson of the Year award for athletes with a disability.

MAHLATSE "CHILIBOY" RALEPELLE

ahlatse "Chiliboy" Ralepelle made history last year by becoming the first black player to captain the Springboks. The fact that it was for an irrelevant match against the World XV was somewhat disappointing, but the Bulls hooker made the most of the opportunity. The 20-year-old Ralepelle is certainly no stranger to captaincy, having led the South African under-19 side to victory in the 2005 IRB U19 World Championship and the South African under-21-side to the final of last year's IRB U21 World Championship. He had previously played in the South African Schools side at the age of 16 and made his senior provincial debut for the Bulls in 2005. Despite his obvious potential, Ralepelle has spent a significant amount of time on the bench since being chosen for the Springbok squad for last year's Tri-Nations. He eventually made his first appearance in the series in his native Pretoria. He was included in the end-of-year Northern Hemisphere tour and played in the second Test against England before being named captain for the final match.

BABALWA NDLELENI-RAMATLAPO

hen the South African Weightlifting Federation visited young Babalwa Ndleleni's school in Crossroads, they could surely not have known they were introducing a medalist in the making to the sport that would eventually see her named South African Sportswoman of the Year in 2006. After taking up the sport at high school and excelling in national competitions, Ndleleni-Ramatlapo took part in her first Commonwealth Games last year, ranked 16th and 22nd in her respective categories. She left Melbourne with a bronze medal, becoming the first black South African woman to win a medal in weightlifting. This achievement, which saw her lifting 78kg in the snatch and 104kg in the clean and jerk, catapulted the Gugulethu nursery school teacher into the limelight. As she strives towards qualification for next year's Olympic Games, she hopes to inspire other women in her area to take up the sport. On her return from the Melbourne Games, Ndleleni-Ramatlapo was awarded a highperformance scholarship programme by the Western Cape minister for cultural affairs and sport.

JUSTINE ROBBESON

ustine Robbeson first appeared on the international stage as a heptathlete, winning gold in that event at the World Junior Championships in Grosseto, Italy, in 2004. This year has also been a good one for the 22-year-old North West University student, who has exceeded the 60m mark in every competition so far, including the South African Championships and the South African Student Championships. Her next aim is the 2007 World Championships in Japan, where she may be on target for a top-five finish if the previous World Championship results, in 2005, are anything to go by.


MARSHA MARESCIA


he may be only 24 years old, but with more than 100 caps to her name, the captain of the South African women's hockey team is one of the most experienced players in the side. Being a player of colour, Marescia's mother was never afforded the opportunity to represent South Africa. But the young player was determined to make it, having started playing hockey at the age of nine. She rose steadily through the ranks, first making it into the Natal team (she played softball at provincial level in primary school) and then the South African under-20 side for the junior World Cup. In 2001, Marescia was selected for the senior national side and has now represented the country at two World Cups, two Commonwealth Games and the Olympics. She took over as captain last year after Lindsey Carlisle retired and will lead the side in this month's four-nations tournament against Ireland, Scotland and Germany in Dublin.

He then flew straight to Dubai where he was co-captain of the South African side that won the first tournament in the IRB Rugby Sevens series — the South Africans came back from 0-12 down at half-time to defeat New Zealand 31-12. Ever the popular player on the field, Floors was the Currie Cup Players' Player of the Year in 2006.

consistent top-five finisher in the world 800m rankings, this athlete from Limpopo has plenty of accolades to show for his efforts. But it was 2004 that produced the highlight of Mulaudzi's career to date. He produced a gold medal-winning performance at the World Indoor Championships in Hungary and then, despite being hampered by illness and injury in the build-up to the 2004 Olympics, claimed a silver medal in Athens after a thrilling duel with Russia's Yuriy Borzakovskiy in the finishing straight. Last year, the 26-year-old star successfully defended his World Indoor Championships title, but an injury ruled him out of doing the same at the Commonwealth Games a few weeks later.

Playing on the left wing, he scored a try against Ireland and was then moved to fullback for the next match against England, where he scored a long-range drop goal. Determined that this wouldn't stand in his way, Pistorius went about life as normal and played rugby, water polo and tennis at Pretoria Boys High. It was a knee injury sustained during a rugby game that led him to the athletics track, where he would go on to break an incredible 26 world records. He was the first athlete with a disability to be invited, in 2005, to a Grand Prix meeting in Helsinki to compete against able-bodied athletes. His desire to compete at the Olympic Games against able-bodied athletes was boosted when he won a silver medal in the 400m at the South African National Championships earlier this year.

JACQUES KALLIS

acques Kallis's performances at the recent ICC World Cup are testament to his pedigree. There is good reason the right-handed batsman from Cape Town is rated as the world's top all-rounder in Test cricket. His figures are hugely impressive. Kallis made his Test debut in December 1995 and his one-day international debut the following month, soon securing the crucial number three spot in the batting line-up and doing some serious damage with his right-arm, fast-medium bowling. With his methodical batting and deceptive bowling, Kallis became the only cricketer to date to have scored 8 000 runs and taken 200 wickets in one-day internationals and Test cricket. In 2005, he was named ICC Test Player of the Year and ICC Player of the Year (an award he shared with England's Andrew Flintoff) after becoming the third man in history, along with Donald Bradman and Mohammad Yousuf, to score five centuries in consecutive Test matches.










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
